Asymptomatic Testing of Staff

In line with government guidance, we are pleased to be rolling out twice weekly testing for staff in school starting Monday 25th January. We hope that this will be an added layer of protection for us all as 1 in 3 people with COVID will not display symptoms.

Important Reminders for Home Learning

We understand that many parents are working from home, whilst home schooling, and we do appreciate how hard this must be. We are still encouraging children to join all live lessons as education must continue so children do not fall behind.


- Please try to upload what your children have been learning to Purple Mash (see below) so that the teachers can keep abreast of where your child is in their learning and what they need to do next. Without this information, teachers are unable to tailor their lessons in the same way that they would if the children were in school.
- We found that children's stamina for extended writing was severely affected during the last lockdown so we will continue to set tasks that require the children to write at length. Please ensure you are also uploading these tasks so that teachers can provide purposeful feedback and know where their children's gaps are within their class.
- When uploading work, please try to do this at the end of each day or at regular intervals through the week to avoid teachers having an influx of work at the weekends when they are then planning ahead for the forthcoming week.
- Please remember teachers are not only teaching children at home, online, but also have children in their classrooms that require support, therefore, please email <u>enquiries@thurlby.lincs.sch.uk</u> if you have any questions, as a parent, rather than asking teachers during the lesson.
- As mentioned in previous correspondence, parents should email the enquiries address with questions/queries and NOT the class teachers. Please do not use the chat function for this purpose either as we need to leave this for child and teacher interactions only.
- All of our children are entitled to the Microsoft Office package using their Thurlby email address. If you need to set this up, simply google Microsoft Office and click on Office 365 Login/Microsoft Office and create your account with your child's Thurlby email address.

How to upload to Purple Mash

We love to see all of the work your children have been completing at home. Uploading your child's work to Purple Mash ensures staff can provide them with encouragement, feedback and any possible next steps. In addition to this, it also enables teachers to tailor their planning for subsequent lessons as they are informed about your child's achievement.


There are a few options for uploading your child's work to Purple Mash. Below is a quick guide for:

- uploading work, photos or videos to your child's work folder
- uploading work after being set a 2Do



Option One - upload to your child's work folder

Option Two - upload to your child's 2Do



After completing a 2Do, you/your child can go back to the '2Do' tab. Click 'Upload Work' (on the relevant 2Do) and the box (as above) will appear. As above, depending how you access Purple Mash, you can then upload files from the relevant folder/app from your laptop/smart phone/tablet. You can upload multiple files/images/videos at once.



Happy New Year

Seatbelts and correctly fitted child car seats should be used for every journey, even shorter ones close to home. Vehicles do not need to be travelling very fast to have a collision that could cause serious injury. If a vehicle stops suddenly, anyone unrestrained will continue to travel forwards instead of being held safely in the seat.

It is a legal requirement for all vehicle occupants to wear seatbelts where they are fitted, both in the front and the back. Children should use correctly fitted car seats or boosters until they are either 135 cm tall or 12 years old (whichever comes sooner).

Despite the chance of a fine of up to £500, many people are happy to break the law and take the risk.

Car parks and driveways

Every year people are injured or lose their lives due to being hit by a vehicle in a car park or on a driveway. Sadly the driver is often a family member or friend who has simply not seen the other person next to the car. It is best to check all blind spots around a vehicle before moving off from a stationary position.

In colder weather it is easy to avoid taking the time to clear windscreens and windows properly when you are in a rush. Any amount of snow, ice or condensation can create a blind spot.

The school run

These zigzagged markings outside schools are to provide a clear, safe area where children can see traffic, and be seen by drivers. Drivers should never stop on them, even for picking up and dropping off children.

Always park where it is safe and legal to do so and make sure your child gets out of the car on the kerb side rather than into the traffic.

You could ask your school if they have a designated park and stride or walking bus facility. Parking further away from school and walking is better for everyone, as well as the environment around the school.
